2023 UCI Cycling World Championships - SPT Progress Update

Report by Chief Executive

1. Object of report

To update members on the 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships being hosted in Scotland in August 2023 and SPT's preparations in support of the event.

2. Background

The 2023 UCI Cycling World Championships takes place from 3 - 13 August 2023 at various locations across Scotland. Major components of the event will be held in and around Greater Glasgow. Further details on the event are available at https://www.cyclingworldchamps.com/

The Championships will be the biggest cycling event ever held, combining 13 separate world championships of various cycling disciplines into one event for the first time and will involve 2,600 athletes from more than 120 countries, with over 8,000 participants overall. Details on the event are included in the presentation attached at Appendix 1.

Over 1 million spectators are expected to attend the event and it is anticipated that this will have a positive economic impact on the economy of the city and wider region. However, as with previous major events hosted in our region, it is expected that there will be significant impact on the transport network and SPT, in partnership with others, is seeking to ensure that any impact is minimised as far as possible.

3. Update

The main impacts of the event on the transport network of the SPT area are as follows:

- Junior Men's and Junior Women's Road Races, Saturday 5 August, affecting a circuit of the City Centre and West End;
- Elite Men's Road Race, Sunday 6 August, affecting approaches to Glasgow via East Dunbartonshire, and a circuit of the City Centre and West End;
- Mixed Relay Time Trial, Tuesday 8 August, affecting a circuit of the City Centre and West End;
- Men's Under 23 Road Race, Saturday 12 August, affecting the Balloch area of West Dunbartonshire, approaches to Glasgow via East Dunbartonshire, and a circuit of the City Centre and West End;

• Elite Women's and Women's Under 23 Road Races, Sunday 13 August, affecting the Balloch area of West Dunbartonshire, approaches to Glasgow via East Dunbartonshire, and a circuit of the City Centre and West End.

In addition to the above, City Centre and West End circuits will be closed to traffic from 4 to 8 August and again on 7, 12 and 13 August. Approach roads leading into the city will be managed by means of rolling roadblocks.

Furthermore, several cycling events are being held at venues within Glasgow, including Knightswood BMX Centre, Glasgow Green, the Emirates Arena and the Sir Chris Hoy Velodrome.

SPT is involved in various workstreams in preparing for the event, including:

- Hosting and attending the National Transport Working Group.
- Hosting and attending the Venue Transport Working Groups.
- Liaising with Subway management in respect of any additional Subway requirements on the Sundays of the event and deployment of volunteers to assist with visitor wayfinding.
 A meeting was held with Subway representatives in this respect on 24 February 2023.
- Liaising with bus station management in respect of deployment of volunteers to assist with visitor wayfinding etc.
- Liaising with the bus industry in respect of connecting the event management with the industry in order to keep them informed of the extensive impact of the event on bus operations. A meeting was held with bus operator representatives to this end on 24 February 2023.
- Liaising with the event organisers in respect of what, if any, requirement there will be of SPT staff in any relevant Transport Control Centre during the event.

Discussions with UCI Cycling World Championships regarding any additional SPT costs relating to the above activities remains ongoing. Additionally, an internal SPT Steering Group has been established to coordinate the above activities across the organisation. Officers will endeavour to keep members updated on any transport issues as the event approaches.


THE BIGGEST CYCLING EVENT IN HISTORY







DEFINITION OF ROAD RACES

2023 UCI Cycling World's Road Race comprises of seven road championships races. Individual time trials are in Stirling and do not touch this region.

Course format:

- •Four races will be completed entirely on a circuit
- •Three races will have remote starts (which subsequently join the circuit).
- •Days: Saturday (circuit only), Sunday (Edinburgh Start), Tuesday (circuit only), Saturday (Balloch Start), Sunday (Balloch Start)



The delivery of the route and infrastructure within Glasgow City's boundary will be managed by Glasgow Life and Glasgow City Council.
